See this year's last lunar eclipse on 19 November

On 19 November, you can see the last lunar eclipse of the year.

A lunar eclipse is when Earth moves between the Sun and the full Moon, blocking out the Moon. However, this time it will be a partial lunar eclipse. This means you will still see a part of the Moon.

This is the second lunar eclipse of the year and experts say that it is the longest one for this century. It will begin at 11:34 am IST on 19 November and will end at 5:33 pm. It will last a total of 6 hours and 1 min

The ending part of the event will be seen from parts of Arunachal Pradesh and Assam in northeastern India. Moreover, people in the US, Northern Europe, East Asia, Australia and the Pacific Ocean region can also see it. NASA says that a lunar eclipse can happen only up to 3 times a year.

Full Moon

The full Moon in November is called the Full Beaver Moon. The name comes from an old belief that beavers start preparing for winter during this time

- This century, Earth will be experiencing a total of 228 lunar eclipses..

- For her valuable contribution in the field of marine biology and environmental protection, Rachel Carson was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1980

Today we will read about a very special scientist named Rachel Louise Carson. She played an important role in the rise of environmental conservation movements in the 20th century.

Rachel Carson was born in Pennsylvania, the US on 27 May 1907. She was raised on a farm, where she learned to love and care for the environment. Young Rachel was also interested in writing, publishing a story at 11.

After studying Biology and Creative Writing, Rachel worked for 15 years as a biologist, scientist and editor in the US Bureau of Fisheries and then the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Her major research topic was oceans and ocean life.

She also wrote many articles to raise awareness about the importance of protecting the environment.

What made Rachel Carson a great scientist and famous writer?

It was a book titled *Silent Spring* (1962) that made Rachel one of the most celebrated environmental activists across the world. The book talked about the wide usage of pesticides and chemicals and how it was badly affecting plants and animals.

The name “*Silent Spring*” refers to the spring without birds’ songs, who died due to pesticides. Moreover, the book actually resulted in the ban of DDT (a dangerous pesticide) in the US.

Using mechanical tools improves our language skills, study finds

Research has revealed a correlation between being particularly proficient in tool use and having good syntactic ability. A new study has now shown that both skills rely on the same neurological resources, which are located in the same brain region. Furthermore, motor training using a tool improves our ability to understand the syntax of complex sentences and -- vice-versa -- syntactic training improves our proficiency in using tools.
